#### **Course Description**

This course investigates major themes in nature and environmental writing. Explores the relationship between humanity and the environment as expressed through fiction, non-fiction and poetry. Examines how literature drives attitudes and policies.

• Students will be able to discuss and identify past and current environmental issues such as; Leave No Trace, Tread Lightly, Gaia, Apiculture, Wilderness Act of 1964, Stewardship . . .

• Students will be able to define and explain the differences between conservation and preservation.

- Students will be able to discuss and identify some of the major influences wilderness has had on the arts, music, literature and political philosophy.
- Students will be able to identify and discuss the characteristic philosophies of Thoreau, Muir, Carson and other significant nature writers.

• Students will be able to explain or summarize the evolutionary trends of attitudes towards wilderness.
