Course Description

Study of Grammar and Syntax. Introduction of more Advanced Grammar. Ample reading of cultural and literary texts. Listening comprehension.

Prerequisites

One of the Following: Spanish 102 with C or better. Two years of High School Spanish. Departmental approval.

You will need internet access and a computer with **microphone** and **video** in order to record yourself speaking in Spanish. Chrome is the preferred browser for Canvas.

Course Policies

Attendance: In order to be considered present, you must submit graded work in **Canvas** by **9PM** on **Thursday, January 19**, otherwise, you will be withdrawn at that time. After this initial deadline has passed, you will need to continue completing work regularly in order to be considered active in the class.

Homework: We will cover one Module every nine calendar days. One-third of a Module (except the first-day-of-class work) is **due every three (3) calendar days**, excluding holidays. If you follow this schedule, you will have a steady progress through the course.

You must submit all homework through the appropriate assignment boxes in Canvas. Emailed attachments and submissions made in the Comment area of assignments are not accepted for credit.

Late work: With a few exceptions (such as the first week of class—due to attendance requirements, and the Finals week—because the semester ends and the course closes), you will have a **grace period** of five days following the due date in which to submit the work *without penalty*. Since the course closes on Friday, March 10th., no work can be submitted after that date.

Assignments

CATEGORY	PERCENTAGE	DESCRIPTION
Pronunciation		Evaluation of pronunciation based on topics covered, pronunciation improvement throughout the semester. These are mostly audio, but may include some writing.
Practice	20%	Practice activities are the most numerous and include a number of 'Actividades' in each lesson. These reinforce vocabulary acquisition, grammar application, and culture.
Speaking	15%	These consist of either 1) a situation that you need to <u>prepare and</u> <u>record</u> : these may require a video submission (audio submissions will earn a zero), 2) answer <u>a series of question</u> s that come from the material of the lesson: these are to be completed as audio submissions.
Writing		These consist of a situation that you need to <u>prepare</u> based on the vocabulary and grammar from the module. These are designed for you to demonstrate mastery of the Module's material. Using vocabulary that was not presented and grammatical structures that have not been covered yet will affect your grade adversely .

Reading	10%	Reading assignments consist of a reading that relates to the theme of the lesson vocabulary and/or grammar, but as many are <u>realia</u> (from authentic sources), they may contain new vocabulary and unfamiliar grammar structures.
Listening	10%	Listening assignments consist of a monologue, narrative, interview, or conversation that relates to the theme of the lesson vocabulary and grammar. Exercises vary.
Final	25%	There are five (5) final assessments: Reading, Writing, Speaking, Listening and Pronunciation. This grade category also includes Cultural Projects (2), a Course Evaluation, and an Exit Survey.

Response Time

Students can expect a response time of 48 hours, excluding weekends and Holidays, for the instructor to respond to messages sent via the Canvas Learning Management System or email. Students can expect assignments to be graded within 2 weeks of the assignment's due date, or one week from when it is submitted (whichever is later).

Attendance Policy

Attendance is **timely completion of online work**. If you stop completing your graded work and haven't submitted anything for a period of **one week** (for 8-week and 5-week classes), or two weeks (for 15-16 week classes) you may be withdrawn without prior notice.

Instructional Contact Hours (Seat Time)

This is a four (4) credit-hour **Accelerated** course. Plan to spend at least **six hours** on course content or seat time (direct instruction) and **twelve hours** on homework weekly.

Online Tutoring
